March 12, 2017

At a special congregational meeting on March 12 the congregation voted to call Pastor Joseph Hughes as an Intentional Interim Pastor at Trinity. He is 63 years old, is married and has 4 adult children. He and his wife reside in Keizer, Oregon. He has had special training in this type of ministry and is a credentialed in Intentional Interim Ministry (IIM).

Scope of activities that would he would provide are:

- Full time ministry
- Would work 5 days/week, including Sundays
 - o Office hours would be on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday
 - o Visits to shut-ins
 - o Mid-week Bible study
 - o Would be available for emergencies
 - o Willing to teach adult class on Sunday mornings
- IIM
 - o Help with congregation self assessment
 - o Identify and help process unresolved issues
 - o Facilitate the process of identifying a direction for the congregation

We are currently working out some details with Pastor Hughes before he officially accepts the

call. One thing he would like to do is get to know Sheridan and our congregation a little better. To that end, he and his wife will be coming to Sheridan on Sunday, March 26, to tour Sheridan with a member of the congregation. Following the tour, he will be meeting with the elected officers and other informal leaders of our congregation.

The other item that we need to agree to is a salary and benefit package. We are working with the District to determine a fair salary based on Pastor Hughes' education and experience. In our previous discussions, he felt that we will be able to settle on a package that fits within what we have budgeted. A financial benefit to having Pastor Hughes is that he would not require housing and the house that was used as the parsonage could be rented out to provide an additional source of revenue for the congregation.

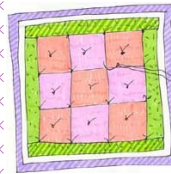

Update from the Norwoods




March 1, 2017

Dear Friends,

I thought it about time to say Happy New Year and to bring you up to date on the Alaska Ministry. No, we are not up in Copper Center but for a long while as we looked out our windows, you would have thought we were. We had snow on the ground since Thanksgiving that at one time was about 14" deep. I had my share of shoveling and am ready for spring. Thankfully most of the snow is gone and the tulips and daffodils are visible. But with all the snow and cold weather, it has given opportunity for lots of prep work for next summer.

We have tickets to fly to Anchorage April 26th. Material lists have been made, prices discovered, a budget made and I have also set up a priority list that will help me keep on track to accomplish first things first. Since a work team of 10 or 11 will arrive June 16th, I want to utilize them to the fullest, especially in installing the dry wall. I have had 2 couples indicate interest in coming to help some, one in late May the other in July. It would be great to have the extra help as there is enough funds in the building fund to finish the upstairs, including heat and water, and much of the basement. We would like to have that much done when we leave next Sept. Then a pastor and family could come and begin ministering full time in the community. As for us, I am scheduled to preach each Sunday from April 30 through Sept. 10, alternating weeks between Chistochina and Mendeltna. And since I was given a fishing license for Christmas, I will have to take a few days to make good use of that piece of paper.

In the meantime, Lani and I have been leading Bible studies here at home and serving in various ways in our local church. We both have been dealing with some health issues. I made a visit to the ER one morning with severe back pain which turned out to be a herniated disk. Medication has relieved the swelling and brought about some healing. It is doing well. Lani was scheduled for some necessary foot surgery the first of March but it had to be postponed due to other issues. She has also been diagnosed with PMR (Polymyalgia Rheumatica), a swelling throughout the body and causes her pain, and muscle weakness. She has been on meds which are helping. She has had appointments with a cardiologist to see about an irregular and slow heartbeat. It looks like the enemy is

trying to throw up some roadblocks to the summer ministry...but God is all powerful and we are trusting Him to get us through all this before we leave for AK.

So we ask that you pray about the health issues, that they will not be a hindrance to our schedule and the work in AK. Pray the Lord will give wisdom to the Dr.'s and bring the necessary healing. Pray also that if it His will, extra help for Craig might be available this summer. Pray that the spiritual ministry of preaching, visiting, VBS, encouraging ones and Bible studies will be fruitful. And pray for wisdom in scheduling and for the Lord to provide not only good help but good prices for materials in order that the project can be completed. Most of all, continue to pray for just the right pastor for Copper Center to be available when the parsonage is finished.

Again, Lani and I, and the folks at Copper Center, Chistochina, Mendeltna and Glennallen, thank you for your support for the ministry there. Without your prayers and financial support and God's direction we would not be doing any of this. We are grateful to all of you that read these updates and send us your comments.

FROM THE HYMNAL

ALL GLORY, LAUD AND HONOR

Theodolph of Orleans
(France) – Written A.D 820

There are many wonderful hymns that were written to express emotions and beliefs connected to the holy seasons of Lent and Easter. I thought it fitting to pick a hymn that specifically refers to the triumphant procession of Christ into Jerusalem. The Palm Sunday procession reminds us that Jesus Christ is still leading His people and it is our responsibility to be His faithful followers and to extol His name and sing His praise.

This Palm Sunday hymn was written approximately A.D 820 by Bishop Theodolph of Orleans, while he was imprisoned at the monastery of Angers. He was well known in his day as a poet, pastor, and the beloved Bishop of Orleans. When Emperor Charlemagne died in 814, the bishop was put into a monastic prison by Charlemagne's son and successor, Louis I the Pious, for allegedly plotting against him. A well-known legend has long been associated with this hymn and believed by many that a short time before the bishop's death in 821, Louis was visiting in the area where the bishop was imprisoned and by chance passed under his cell. The bishop is said to have been singing by himself. When the emperor heard this particular text being sung, he was so moved by the incident that he immediately ordered the bishop's release.

"All glory, laud and honor to Thee, Redeemer, King, to whom the lips of children made sweet hosannas ring: Thou art the King of Israel Thou David's royal son, who in the Lord's name comest, the King and blessed One!"

CINNAMON ROLLS



(From The American Test Kitchen, Family Baking Book)

Makes 12

These soft rolls bake into each other, but can be pulled apart easily before serving of at the table. This is the best dough for cinnamon rolls we have found. The dough is soft and sponge like, the finished product is soft and nice. I doubled the recipe and added several drops of cardamom oil to the dough and about 1 teaspoon cardamom to the cinnamon sugar filling.

Basic Sweet Dough:

3/4 cup buttermilk

6 Tablespoons (3/4 stick) butter, melted and cooled

3 large eggs

4 ¼ cups all-purpose flour

¼ cup sugar

1 envelope (2 ¼ teaspoons) instant or rapid-rise yeast

1 ¼ teaspoon salt

(I add cardamom oil, and ground cardamom to taste)

Roll filling:

¾ cup packed light brown sugar

2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

¼ teaspoon ground cloves

½ - 1 teaspoon ground cardamom

Pinch of salt

1 Tablespoon butter, melted and cooled.

Glaze:

1 ½ cups (6 oz.) confectioners' sugar

3 tablespoons cream cheese, softened

3 Tablespoons buttermilk or milk

½ teaspoon vanilla extract

The dough can be mixed in a mixer, with a food processor, or by hand.

(Editor's Note: *Because of space limitations, below is the "Mixer Method". If you'd like the complete recipe let me know & I will print it off for you! G.J.)*

Mixer Method:

1. Whisk the buttermilk, melted butter, and eggs together in a large liquid measuring cup. Combine 4 cups of the flour, sugar, yeast, and salt together in a standing mixer fitted with

the dough hook. With the mixer on low speed, add the buttermilk mixture and mix until the dough comes together, about 2 minutes.

2. Increase the mixer speed to medium and knead until the dough is smooth and elastic, about 10 minutes. If after 5 minutes more flour is needed add the remaining ¼ cup flour, 1 tablespoon at a time, until the dough clears the side of the bowl but sticks to the bottom.

3. Turn the dough out onto a clean surface and knead by hand to form a smooth, round ball. Place the dough in a lightly oiled bowl and wrap tightly with plastic wrap. Let rise in a warm, draft-free place until doubled in size, 2 to 2 ½ hours.

To Make Ahead

In step 3, do not let the rolls rise, but refrigerate them overnight or up to 16 hrs. Let the rolls sit at room temperatures until they have nearly doubled in size, about 1 hour, then bake as directed.

Directions for Making Rolls:

For the rolls: Grease a 13x9 inch baking pan. Mix the brown sugar, cinnamon, cloves, and salt, together in a small bowl. Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured counter and press it into a 12-inch rectangle. Brush the dough with the melted butter, and then sprinkle the brown sugar mixture over it, leaving a ¾ inch border along the top edge. Press on the filling to adhere it to the dough.

Loosen the dough from the counter using a bench scraper and roll the dough into a tight log. Pinch the seam closed and roll the log seam side down. Gently stretch the log to be 18 inches in length with an even diameter and pat the ends to even them.

Slice the cylinder into 12 evenly sized rolls (about 1 ½ inches wide) using a serrated knife. Arrange the rolls cut side down in the prepared baking pan and wrap tightly with greased plastic wrap. Let rise in a warm place until the rolls have nearly doubled in size and are pressed against one another, 1 to 1 ½ hours.

Adjust an oven rack to the middle position and heat the oven to 350 degrees. Bake the rolls until golden and puffed, 25- 30 minutes.

For the glaze: Flip the rolls out onto a wire rack set over a sheet of parchment paper and let cool for 5 minutes. Whisk the confectioners' sugar, softened cream cheese, buttermilk, and vanilla together in a medium bowl until smooth. Flip the rolls upright, drizzle with the glaze and serve.
